

Safeguarding the Nursing Home Environment: The Ombudsman's Role





The Center for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) states that nursing homes should work to provide an environment that is "homelike".

A homelike environment includes one that allows resident personal items such as photos, artwork, and even personal furnishings. This supports the overall well-being of residents.

A nursing home must also ensure a safe environment, one that is clean, comfortable, and allows residents to receive care and services safely and maximizes a resident's independence.

Ombudsman Action Steps

You have an important role in safeguarding the nursing home environment while preserving resident rights. Assist the nursing home community in balancing a homelike living environment with one that is safe, uncluttered, and sanitary by:

- Observing & asking residents and staff regarding homelike & personal as well as safety & sanitary items listed below.
- Sharing what you observed and learned with administration and staff, offering assistance to reach resolutions.
